"The punishment for sin is first physical death, but ultimately it is eternal damnation.

- **2.** "Obviously, Christ did not undergo the punishment of eternal damnation; otherwise, he would still be in hell suffering for sin.
- **3.** "Further, there is **no Scripture** specifying that Christ suffered the eternal punishment of hell for sin. GW see Colossians 2:13–14
- **4.** "If Christ had paid the eternal consequence for everyone's sin, God would have **no** recourse to punish anyone because the sin would have already been adjudicated.
- **5.** "God could not demand double payment for the same sin. We must conclude then, that Christ did not take upon himself the entire punishment required of man for sin.
- **6.** "Although the Scripture sometimes speaks of salvation being purchased, this refers only to the requirements Christ had to satisfy in order to make salvation possible for the whole world." (1 John 2:1). (SUNGENIS, 56)

"IN CATHOLIC THEOLOGY, justification is not a one-time act of God.

"Although for New Testament believers' justification begins at a specific point in time, (i.e., baptism).

"Justification continues as a process throughout the individual's life. God gives his grace to the individual at baptism,

"But he also gives grace continually throughout the course of life. A person gains grace as he lives out his Christian life in obedience. GW - Grace is a gift of God. Eph. 2:8–9.

"As grace increases, justification increases, and the individual becomes more and more righteous in the eyes of God.

"If God removes justifying grace from the individual, then justification ceases. This occurs when the individual commits serious sin—

"In the final analysis, if the justifying grace begun at baptism is not present at the end of a person's life,

"Then he will remain unjustified and be condemned for eternity." (SUNGENIS, 150)

7. "THE PROTESTANT [Christian] understanding of ... justification—It is simply a legal declaration that

"God makes, designating the person to be in a justified state.

"The justified state means that God has forgiven his sins because Christ took the guilt and paid the penalty for his sins.

"Acceptance by faith means that, though undeserving, the individual receives the righteousness of Christ if he simply acknowledges its availability and efficacy by believing that he can receive it.

"Once this is done, the theological category of **justification** is **complete and secure** and the now justified Christian immediately passes into another theological category called sanctification.

"The Christian begins to live a holy life by refraining from sin, doing good works, praying, etc.—

Justification is a one-time legal act administered by God, while sanctification is the ongoing process of personal holiness." (SUNGENIS, 149–150) GW - Sounds correct, believe in Jesus: eternally - saved, Justified, forgiven!

Paul's scriptural support for Christ-ian Justification.

"(Jesus) Who was delivered for our offences and was raised again for our Justification." (Rom. 4:25)

"And not as it was by one (Adam) that sinned, so is the gift: for the judgment was by one to condemnation, but the free gift is of many offences unto Justification." (Rom. 5:16)

"By the offence of one (Adam) judgment came upon all men to condemnation; even so by the righteousness of one (Jesus) the free gift came upon all men unto Justification of life." (Rom. 5:18)

The free gift is received by faith.

Jesus's victory becomes yours by faith! 1 John 2:1,

"If any man sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ—the propitiation for our sins: and not for ours only, but also for the sins of the whole world." (1 John 2:1–2) Your sin debt owed to God has been paid in full.

"[God,] Having forgiven you all trespasses; Blotting out the handwriting of ordinances that was against us, which was contrary to us, and [yes] took it out of the way, nailing it to his (Jesus's) CROSS." (Col. 2:13–14) Here is Paul speaking on the inheritance of believers,

"That we should be to the praise of his glory, who first trusted in Christ. In whom ye also trusted, after that ye heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation: in whom also after that ye believed, ye were sealed with that holy Spirit of promise, Which is the earnest of our inheritance until the redemption of the purchased possession, unto the praise of his glory—That the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give unto you the spirit of wisdom and revelation in the knowledge of him: The eyes of your understanding being enlightened; that ye may know what is the hope of his calling, and what the riches of the glory of his inheritance in the saints, And what is the exceeding greatness of his power to us-ward who believe." (Eph. 1:12–19)

Paul: Acts 20:28, A WARNING! to Church Leaders.

"Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock, over the which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers, to feed the church of God, ("All the counsel of God." Acts 20:27) which he hath purchased with his own blood."

GARY WESTGERDES Concerning circumcision of the flesh: God rebuked the Jews; he wanted their hearts circumcised. In the same sense now in "Christendom" baptism of the flesh means nothing if it comes before faith in Christ. The only baptism that Cleanses away your sin is the Holy Spirit's. He is the one that knows your faith in Jesus, your heart's desire for forgiveness and cleansing, and he knows if you really mean it.

Paul did not preach baptism.

"For Christ sent me not to baptize, but to preach the gospel: not with wisdom of words, lest the cross of Christ should be made of none effect. [*yes] For the preaching of the cross is to them that perish foolishness; (see # 1) "But

"Unto us which are saved it is the power of God—it pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe—[yes] We Preach Christ Crucified."

(1 Cor. 1:17–18, 21, 23) Not Christ Consumed.

Jesus paid off your sin debt in full, with his blood. Since he was sinless, his physical death paid your sin debt without him having to spend an eternity in hell. By God's grace you will be saved through faith, sacramental grace is not necessary.

[yes] "For by **one offering** he hath perfected for ever them that are sanctified." (Heb. 10:14)

The Mass, a re-offering of the sacrifice of the Cross in an un-bloody manner, **is not necessary.**

"For Christ is not entered into the holy places made with hands—Nor yet that he should offer himself often—For then must he often have suffered since the foundation of the world: but [yes] now once in the end of the world hath he appeared to put away sin by the sacrifice of himself." (Heb. 9:24–26)

The Catholic Priesthood is not necessary.

PETER, "Ye also, as lively stones, are built up a **spiritual house**, an holy **priesthood**, to offer up **spiritual sacrifices**, acceptable to God by Jesus Christ." (1 Pet. 2:5) **PAUL**, **[yes]** "Let us offer the **Sacrifice of praise** to God **continually**, that is, the fruit of our lips **giving thanks** to his name. But to do good and to **communicate** (be giving) forget not: for with such **Sacrifices** God is well pleased." (Heb. 13:14–16)

Purgatory is not necessary or available.

"There is—now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit. For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ [yes] Jesus hath made me free from the law of sin and death. For what the law could not do, in that it was weak through the flesh, God sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and for sin, condemned sin in the flesh." (Rom. 8:1–3)
