The Rev. Stechschulte's article on 3-18-16 starts out well with the story of the rich man who cries out from hell to Abraham to send someone to his brother's to tell them to repent so they can escape the torment. But Abraham tells him that if they do not believe Moses and the Prophets neither will they believe if someone comes from the dead. St. Luke who is telling us this is quoting Jesus' words. Moses and the Prophets refers to the scripture of the Old Testament, Jesus was emphasizing the fact that a person must search God's word for the truth in order to come to a saving faith in the Messiah.
